While the Koi Whisperer has been available on the Internet for some time (check out our past issues to see how long), we have always created the print edition first, then adding it to the web later. We have changed our focus and will be creating web content, then assembling a print edition from that.

While the two processes are similar, eg.writing an article, there are distinct differences between the two. Perhaps the most notable difference is that we can further develop the reading environment. We can place photos closer to their associated articles and can even add slideshows and videos to the article. If we thought it absolutely necessary, we could add background music to accompany your reading time, however, as our tastes in music are probably very different, we will refrain from doing so at this time.

You might be wondering what will happen to the print edition. A continued print edition serves the club in a number of ways. Chief among them is that we have a number of members who still prefer to receive the print edition rather than read it on their computers. They will continue to receive their print edition for as long as they like.

Secondly, it allows us to have a "printer friendly" version of the newsletter as printing from the new web page formats often generates unpredictable results. The version you print will be the same format and style as the version we continue to mail out.

A third purpose is that it encapsulates the newsletter so we can archive it as a single pdf formatted file. In this way, we can provide back issues in an easily-portable way.

A larger web presence will bring more prominence to the club and our mission to promote the koi hobby. Several tools are available to help us reach that larger audience and we hope to reach many more in the coming months.




Ultra Balance Koi Foods wants your koi hobbyists stories

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
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

FEEDING AND TEMPERATURE

I've been thinking of introducing short articles in this newsletter regarding information I've gathered over the years. Most of the information will be from the AKCA koi health advisor course in which I participated in 2011. Some will be from articles and other koi hobbyists.

From time to time I meet koi kichi who are unaware that there is a relationship with feeding, water temperature, growth and koi health. As this article is written, it is winter and the air and water temperatures are low. Many hobbyists are still attempting to feed their koi and wondering why they aren't eating as much or are acting ill. I feel that this first article should be about water temperature and feeding. There are many aspects of koi feeding that are important including nutritional value, age of the food, where it's stored, etc. But let's keep this short and concentrate on feeding times and amount.

Koi growth takes place when the water is temperature is above 59 degrees. Below that a koi's metabolic rate slows and food intake is slowed. KHA instructor Chris Neaves wrote in a 2002 article that at water temperature below 50 degrees, feeding should be restricted and even stopped. Fasting for a few weeks will not hurt them. He feels that undigested food in the gut could cause the food to ferment and produce toxins. I learned from a koi hobbyist/veterinarian, that koi will continue to digest the food but at a much slower rate. Regardless, poorly digested or uneaten food in your pond leads to poor water quality.

My koi had been sitting at the bottom of the pond, barely moving when the temperature was very low. Today, as I write this, it has been raining, the sun shining off and on and the water temperature is about 46 degrees. The koi are active and swimming around. I want to feed them but I know they will eat algae in the pond if hungry. Their metabolism will dictate that. If there is a period of relatively long and warmer temperature during the winter, I may feed them something of low protein value and it will be a small quantity. I know several koi hobbyists who will not feed them at all until the water temperature is in the mid to upper 50's with no ill effects.

Following are feeding recommendations by ToMiGai (water temp in Fahrenheit):

82 and > Feed once daily

72-82 Feed in small, frequent quantities, total amount no more than 3% body weight

55-72 Feed once daily

50-55 No more than twice weekly
